

Pilot Projects (2018)





1. Coventry Young Ambassadors Exhibition of 'Peace Trees'


'from tragic loss to peace'

KEY ELEMENTS

- Relatively simple project for teachers and children to undertake in the classroom
- 180 Coventry Young Ambassadors (CYAs) created individual peace poems (tanzaku) hung from hand-made wind chimes (furin) made from recycled materials.
- Efforts of all the children put together added value/strength to the children's messages of peace & reconciliation by creating CYA (Reusable) 'Peace Trees'
- Opportunities for shared learning of the children's peace messages at appropriate & timely public events/exhibitions in both Coventry and London.

2. Coventry Young Ambassadors' Perform Peace & Reconciliation Stories/Songs

KEY ELEMENTS

- Studied the impact of WW2 on Coventry & Hiroshima, now International Cities of Peace, (including virtual session with Keiko Ogura)
- Learned about another cultural art form (noh theatre) from two workshops organised with the *Between the Stones* team, working with professional noh actor (Kinue Oshima), mask maker (Kitazawa Hideta) and the Japan Society
- Created travel songs and a short noh-influenced play about conflict, peace and reconciliation and examples performed at Coventry Cathedral twice 1) Hiroshima Day, 6 August 2019, 2) Coventry City of Culture, Japan Arts Festival 2021.

3. Coventry Young Ambassadors' Japanese Peace Garden - 'Islands of Peace' - a children's legacy


KEY ELEMENTS

- Children created a beautiful 'mindful' space from 'idea to reality' (involved in design, planning and delivery including the opening ceremony) which supports all Action Areas
- Benefits communities locally and internationally
- Supported by many collaborators (including the Japanese Garden Society, expert construction workers and many funding partners, and in-kind resources (mostly people's time) primarily because of the children's involvement
- Transformative project for all involved, which would not have been possible without local leadership





Pilot Projects - some additional thoughts



The pilot projects provide a number of generic points that may be useful to others - in different ways - as part of the UNESCO Arts & Culture Initiative.

Some additional thoughts:

We were reminded that young people:

- have a good understanding, and can synthesise effectively, humanitarian concepts such as the need for peace, reconciliation and sustainability
- have the capacity to accept and learn from cultures very different from their own
- are also keen to keep an open mind and positively seek out opportunities and additional benefits that may appear, or can be created, along the way
- appreciate projects that can work on a number of levels to add value and benefit and that this is not only possible, but critically important.

UNESCO ASPnet - Three Action Areas

Why the three UNESCO ASPnet Action Areas are important to everybody?

It is vital for the world to tackle three of the greatest challenges facing humanity. These are also key UNESCO ASPnet Action Areas:

- achieving a culture of peace and non-violence and a meaningful sense of global citizenship
- delivering sustainable development and sustainable lifestyles
- and learning across cultures and appreciating cultural diversity and heritage.

'The UNESCO ASPnet Action areas are vital, interrelated and urgent for everybody.

Without peace we cannot achieve sustainability, and without having a tolerant relationship between cultures we will not have peace.

Without peace, all of our human rights are at risk.

Art has the potential to provide a creative mirror through which we can reflect on our impact on society.'

The Arts & Culture for Peace Initiative encourages action that supports the three UNESCO ASPnet Action Areas and at the same time will benefit individual children and our wider communities.

Project activities

Your school could develop any of the following 'transformative' arts & culture for peace projects to benefit individual students and the wider community:

- e-forest for Peace the development of artistically dynamic peace trees (real or imagined)
 involving the creation of peace poems and/or peace images to highlight the importance of
 living in peace with ourselves, our communities and our planet
- Performing Arts for Peace the development and performance of stories, plays and songs that reflect our global citizenship, cultural diversity and the challenges of ensuring a more peaceful world
- Gardens for Peace the creation of peace gardens that support the well-being of others, as well as convey the critical and urgent importance of living more peacefully and sustainably with nature, ourselves and our planet.
- Outcomes will be shared internationally.

UNESCO ASPnet Arts & Culture for Peace

How can you participate?

- Who? The Initiative is open to pre-primary, primary, secondary, technical or vocational education, (in formal or non-formal settings), and to teacher training
- Does what? Schools can work flexibly on one, two, or all three of the Arts & Culture for Peace activities or any combination of these in support of the ASPnet Action Areas Schools are asked to begin by undertaking their own study of 'conflict and peace'
 In realising their ideas, Schools are asked to use a 'less is more' creative and philosophical approach to reflect the spirit of sustainability across diverse cultures
- With whom? Schools can undertake new work, or join a project to add further value to existing work.
 - Schools could collaborate with artists and other partners
- With what effect? The results of these activities should aim to benefit local and (by sharing outcomes, also) international communities as well as represent the ASPnet Action Areas.

- To illustrate that 'from acorns mighty oak trees do grow' individual creative elements from
 each student can be enjoyed, shared, discussed and combined to produce creative group

- To give voice to our children the future belongs to them their ideas about how we can strengthen the ASPnet Action Areas matter and can support the international community effectively by creating opportunities from the challenges which lay ahead...
